Study Tips

Study and Revision

1. Create the right environment for study

- * quiet area
- * sufficient space and light
- * switch off mobile phone
- * use headphones if necessary to block out distractions *organise your materials

2. Create a study schedule, including:

- * regular breaks
- * commitments sport, work
- * times for friends and relaxation

3. Reference sheet

* have your reference sheet out every class or study period and refer to it regularly!

* annotate the reference sheet you use to study - not all concepts or formulae are on the sheet

* know how to use every formula for your level of Mathematics -Extension students should know how to derive the formula

4. Calculator

- * incorrect calculator use is the cause of many wrong answers in exams
- * practise using all of the necessary functions of your calculator

* know when to use brackets and other features

5. Learning Material:

- * don't just read through the textbook or your notes!
- * the only way to learn Maths is to do Maths
- * don't just practise the questions you can do
- * identify your weaknesses and work through these with help from your teacher or anyone else who has a competent mastery of the material

* your aim isn't to master a text book, your aim is to master the syllabus

* you don't need to obsess about doing every question

* do some easy questions to help you learn the rudiments of a concept, then a few harder ones and finally a few challenging ones
